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Introduction

Pregnant women deserve more from clinical research than what they are getting.

Justice requires a research agenda that adequately addresses the health needs of pregnant women.

Global Forum in Bioethics of 2016

- NEC reps attended the 2016 GFBR : Theme was "Ethics of Research in pregnancy"
 - Inclusion of pregnant women in research
 - Cultural norms for consent
 - Community engagement

- RECs to consider both risks of participation and non-participation

Awarded a fellowship to improve ethical practice for research in pregnancy **Ethics Guideline for Inclusion of Pregnant Women in Research : Zimbabwe**

- Participation in Research by Pregnant Women
- Overcoming Barriers to Include Pregnant in Research
- Ethics Committees
- Potential Individual Benefits and Risks
- Informed Consent

MRCZ Annual Health Research Forum

- Topic on inclusion of pregnant women in CTs
 Need to find ways of ensuring that we generate data on safety of drugs during pregnancy
- Change of culture among RECs, researchers OBGYNs, antenatal HCW, funders, drug manufacturers etc.
- From justifying inclusion to justifying exclusion as a country

Change in Attitude

- Approved study : Qualitative assessment of acceptability of vaginal ring and oral PrEP during pregnancy and breastfeeding
- REC now requesting strong justification on exclusion of pregnant women, including withdrawal of study product

Conclusion

Pregnant women deserve access to effective treatment

- Pregnant women deserve access to safe treatment
- Pregnant women deserve *equitable access* to trials carrying the prospect of direct benefit
